He is also the author of "A Beat Beyond: The Selected Prose of Major Jackson" edited by Amor Kollil.


Emory Libraries receives 2024 Library Excellence in Access and Diversity Award from Insight Into Diversity Magazine

Emory Libraries received the 2024 Library Excellence in Access and Diversity (LEAD) Award from Insight Into Diversity magazine, the largest and oldest diversity and inclusion publication in higher education. The LEAD Award honors academic library programs, policies and initiatives that encourage and support diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) across their campus and surrounding community. These include, but are not limited to, research, technology, accessibility, exhibitions and community outreach.

Emory Libraries will be featured along with 55 other award recipients in the March 2024 issue of Insight Into Diversity magazine.

"Emory Libraries takes an expansive view of access and diversity, in close alignment with the university's mission and pillars," says Valeria F. Diaz, vice provost of Emory Libraries and the Michael C. Carlos Museum. "The work involves many key partners including library leadership, our DEI committees, the libraries' human resources team and the university's Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. The work is always evolving, and at its best it must be responsive, proximate and relevant to those we serve and the communities where we reside. We are grateful for this award and look forward to the work to come."

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
Emory sociologist Karida L. Brown nominated for NAACP Image Award

Emory sociologist Karida L. Brown has been nominated for an NAACP Image Award for the anthology she and her husband, artist Charly Palmer, assembled as a reimagined, updated take on the first periodical for Black children.

The couple are among five nominated books in the Outstanding Literary Work — Nonfiction category for "The New Brownies Book: A Love Letter to Black Families."

"Karida Brown and Charly Palmer have edited and organized a spectacular volume, one that honors both the legacy of W.E.B. Du Bois and celebrates the voices and experiences of the volume's contributors," says Timothy Dowd, professor and chair of the Department of Sociology. "The New Brownies Book" will be impactful for families, students and scholars alike."

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Strengthening campus community through employee resource groups

Employee resource groups (ERGs) are relatively new to Emory University, but they have been making a big impact on campus, helping to foster stronger social connections and a sense of belonging within the university community.

The ERGs are voluntary, employee-led groups established around common interests, purpose and characteristics, typically for underrepresented identities and their allies. They aim to create a supportive and inclusive community at Emory.

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Emory Purpose Project offers opportunities for students to reflect on purpose and meaning

If Emory chose a word of the year as dictionaries do, "purpose" would be a strong contender. Emory Purpose Project (EPP) promises to further embed purpose and meaning into the fabric of the university's educational experience and culture through collaborative programs and workshops for Emory students, faculty and staff.

"Pursuit of purpose is a very personal journey, yet we don't embark on that journey alone," says Ira Bedzow, EPP executive director. "We therefore need to build a community where people care about each other and the impact each of us can have. That is what the Emory Purpose Project is working to do."
